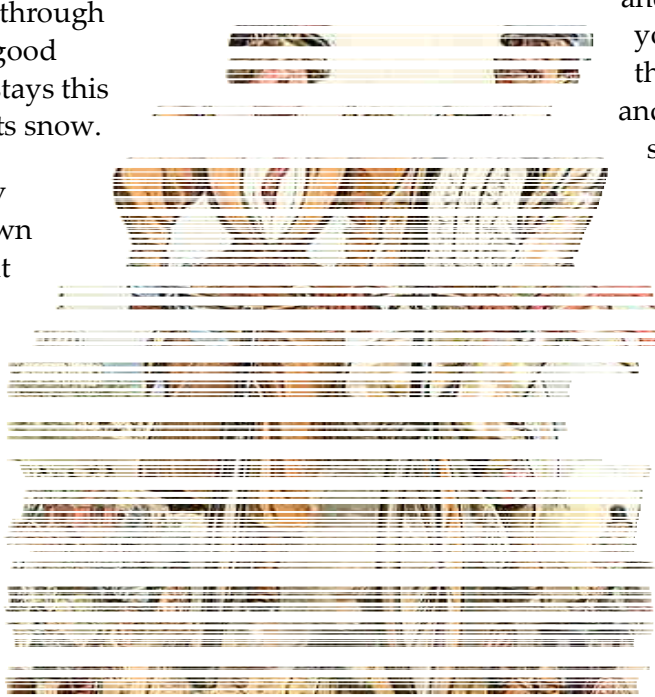

Annual Meeting News

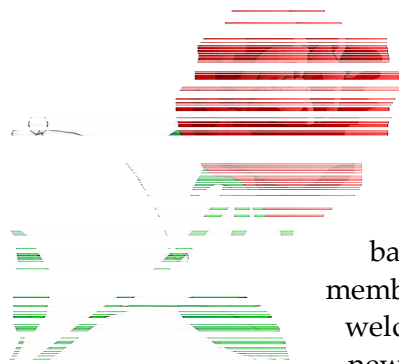
Doe Run's annual winter congregational meeting featured reflections on a busy and a productive year of mission and service, and concerns about the need to gain greater support for our budget in 2006.

Unveiled with the annual report was the 2006 unified budget, a total of \$127,326.00, a 2.2% increase over 2005's budget of \$124,535.00, and 6.2% above 2005's actual expenditures of \$119,907.28. Not included in this figure is the expense of our youth minister, which is presently being funded through income on the Shaneman Memorial Fund.

During 2005, Doe Run welcomed 22 new members, and lost 21 members through transfer, death or removal. In addition, 34 members were transferred to the inactive roll, for a year-end total membership of 209. 2005 was a record year with 11 baptisms. Counting baptized members children of members removed or inactive, and welcoming baptized children of new members, our baptized

member roll now stands at 133. We also remembered this year the passing of four members, Nellie Entrekin, Winnie Haines, Arnold Herzog and Raymond Weidler.

Nancy Hensel was elected as a deacon to fill the unexpired term of Jeanie Silver. We thank Jeanie for her service and look forward to Nancy's service on the Board of Deacons.



Mission News

Mission: Guatemala

The Mission Committee directly supports four international missionaries through the funds designated by the Session for mission. This month we would like to focus on Marcia Towers who has been working in Quetzaltenango, Guatemala since July 2004 in partnership with the Evangelical Presbyterian Church of Guatemala. There she is a site coordinator for the Young Adult Volunteer Program, hosting delegations and mission teams that travel to Guatemala to work and learn among Guatemalan Presbyterians, coordinating the logistics, communication, transportation, training, translating, and debriefing involved in these visits.

Guatemala is one of the poorest countries in the Western hemisphere, but is now in a period of relative peace, following decades of turmoil, violence, and resistance. Marcia's call there came after working several years along the Mexican border and in El Salvador. While she is very busy in her job coordinating visits from volunteers, she says, "I still believe that what I learned during my participation in the Reconciliation and Mission program a few years ago: that our *being* and *listening* is much more important than what we *do* ... I am meeting with people who ask me to listen to them, observing and learning from my Guatemalan co-workers in PRESGOV, asking many questions, hearing many very different analyses of the struggles and promises in the Presbyterian Church of Guatemala,



and thinking and praying to discern in what way God has called me to serve here in this position."

Marcia holds a bachelor's degree in industrial engineering from Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University of Blacksburg, Virginia, and a master's in public and international affairs from the University of Pittsburgh. She is a member of Highland Presbyterian Church in Lancaster, Pennsylvania.

When Roy came to the party on Saturday evening he brought us a branch of flowering forsythia which he had brought indoors last week and forced to a premature blossoming. It is to be planted as the first offering in our Friendship garden. There seem to be very few flowers or shrubs here and they, like the trees, bear strong witness of a lack of care or attention. I think there are two weigelas, some spirea, possibly white and pink both, an old lilac, possibly a mock orange and a few iris and some scraggly, straggly rose bushes. Such a paradise for a would-be gardener and plenty to do for years to come.
